Introduction

- Health inequity disproportionately affects children and young people, yet their rights and voices can be overlooked in healthcare settings.
- The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) is now incorporated into Scottish law
- There is a need for health and social care
 professionals to understand and implement a rightsbased approach in practice.
- This initiative aimed to enhance workforce knowledge and confidence in children's rights through short, accessible learning sessions.

Aim

To enhance understanding of the UNCRC (Incorporation) (Scotland) Act 2024 to a wide audience

Method

- Bite-Sized Learning: Key information delivered in concise, engaging formats.
- Flexible Scheduling: Sessions delivered at various times and on different days to suit workforce needs.

Reach and participation

- Over 2,100 attendees across multiple sessions, averaging close to 200 participants per session.
- Broad NHS and beyond Reach: Staff from varied roles and locations attended
- Increased Understanding: Participants gained further understanding of the new legislation and its impact on healthcare.

UNCRC Incorporation Act

NES are commissioned to offer support all health boards with the implementation of the UNCRC (Incorporation) (Scotland) Act 2024.

- The Act came in to full power on 16th July 2024
- Makes it unlawful for health boards or services to act against UNCRC requirements.
- Allows children, young people, and representatives to enforce rights in court.
- Empowers the Children's Commissioner to take legal action.
- Requires public authorities to report on UNCRC compliance every three years (replacing the 2014 duty).

Why 30 minute sessions worked

- Time-Efficient: Short sessions fit easily into busy schedules.
- Focused content improves engagement and understanding.
- Signposting: Promote resources to support learning
