

Empowering through Education: Supporting International Medical Graduates in NHS Lanarkshire

Introduction


In 2023, 68% of doctors registering with the GMC were non-UK graduates (2). International Medical Graduates (IMGs) are an integral part of health care provision in Scotland. Through the creation of regular high-quality educational sessions in NHS Lanarkshire, we hope to empower IMGs to enhance their clinical and non-clinical skills, and in doing so take steps to improve health equity.


Method

IMG candidates working across the acute, social and primary care sites, within NHSL, were invited to attend core sessions covering a variety of medical specialties. Sessions were delivered on a monthly basis, initially as half day sessions moving to full day sessions based on feedback. The specialty topic was advertised prior to sign up and pre-reading material provided to candidates on enrolment. The teaching format included clinical skills, medical scenarios, simulation, lecture-based and prescribing. Upon completion candidates were provided with certificates of attendance and an appropriate number of CPD points awarded.

Results

- From November 2023 to January 2025 there have been 174 candidate attendances
- 110 faculty members in total, averaging 8 educators per session.
- >96% of candidates agree they would 'definitely' recommend these sessions to a colleague
- 99% of responses from faculty advocated that these sessions were beneficial to the candidates
- Graph 1 illustrates self evaluated increase in knowledge following education sessions.
- Graph 2 shows the majority of attendees felt the quality of educational sessions was 'very good' or 'excellent'





Conclusion

Though inadequate to demonstrate improved patient care, feedback illustrates the provision of these high quality, interactive sessions improves knowledge and confidence in clinical skills. From literature we understand medical education plays a vital role in patient centred care and thus health equity (3)(4).



Candidate feedback is largely positive with requests for more/longer and increased frequency of sessions.
